

'YES TO GALLOWAY, NO TO A NATIONAL PARK'

Here are 6 reasons why you should say NO to a National Park:

GOVERNANCE: Yes to local accountability, No to central government control

National Parks are run by a park authority, directly accountable to Scottish Ministers, not the local community.

The Consultation states that 'at least 60% of Board members would be local representatives'. However, 30% of board members are Scottish Government appointments answerable to ministers. Experience of board members in other parks shows the Minister calls the shots.

CONSERVATION: Yes to protecting nature, No to unmanageable tourism

Proponents of a new National Park describe potential for economic development through increased tourism due to the National Park brand.

No detail is given to how nature will be protected from the enormous stress of mass tourism – soil erosion, increased pollution, habitat loss, littering and noise pollution.

INVESTMENT: Yes to investment in infrastructure and services, No to costly bureaucracy
Infrastructure in Dumfries and Galloway, including key roads like the A75 and A77,
is not fit for purpose and local public services are over-stretched.
Funding for a new National Park is supposedly around £10million. This money should be

spent upgrading our roads, growing the economy, and improving vital public services.

HOUSING: Yes to affordable housing, No to second homes and holiday lets

Availability of affordable housing in Scottish National Parks is constrained by high prices driven by demand for second homes and holiday rentals.

Dumfries and Galloway declared a 'Housing Emergency' last year. A National Park would add stress to an already significant problem, making it harder for younger generations or

low-income families to live in the area and contribute to the local economy.

ECONOMY: Yes to sustainable employment, No to low wage seasonal jobs

Being a designated National Park does not automatically boost local economies and will do little to create well-paid jobs with real career prospects not reliant on passing visitor trade.

Crippling environmental regulations bring restrictions on land use. Support was given through the Agriculture and Rural Communities (Scotland) Act – the last thing that is now needed is restrictions on farmers and the mature Dumfries and Galloway agricultural economy.







If this is to be a National Park made in Galloway, for Galloway - then the people of Galloway should have the final say!

If the Scottish Government agree to Dumfries & Galloway Council's request for a local referendum, it would only happen after the Consultation period, so please do not forget to submit your views to NatureScot's consultation.
